Artist Statement

Darkside How to Draw Trees Magbh McIntyre

Subverting mainstream oral history's tendency to focus on the big events in life (birth, death, marriage and war), Mc Intyre's work *How to Draw Trees* sculpturally addresses the unheard, and commonplace tales of the lives of those around her. Starting with the premise 'tell me a story' McIntyre's work sees her take on the role of storyteller, re-imaging tales from her own perspective with low-tech, reclaimed materials. Multiple, overlapping narratives are forced into co-existence revealing both their content and structure. Like the uncontrollable unfolding of conversation meandering, pacing, interrupted McIntyre's installation presents the multiplicity inherent in the telling of tales, through the process of recounting and interpreting stories.

Artist Statement

The stories I love come at their subject matter sideways. Full of ambiguity and complication these are stories of lives that resist homogenisation. I am interested in exploring the so-called minor details of people's lives -the personal and incidental elements that are likely to be forgotten or considered insignificant. I seek to draw out the inherent life of objects and situations, revealing this as existing in endless variations beyond the limitations of dominant cultural narratives.
